# ~~NATIONAL VOTER REGISTRATION DAY~~

The League of Women Voters Mobile Rock! At this year's National Voter Registration Day in September a total of nine League members and four volunteers joined us in the Atrium at Government Plaza for voter registration. Additionally, voter registration took place using Vote 18 at Murphy High School. We also had a League Board member, our Parliamentarian Charletta House, working with her sorority, the Deltas, and the NAACP to help drive up voter registration in Mobile. Myra Evans with Vote 18 reported that she, along with Lella Lowe and Holly Wiseman performed Vote 18 for six different classes at Murphy High School and had an impressive 88 voter registrants. I can't stop smiling and I couldn't be more pleased.

Our efforts produced over 30 people completing voter registration forms in Government Plaza. We received words of appreciation and encouragement for our efforts from elected officials. Mayor Stimpson and Councilmembers, County Commissioners, attorneys and city workers all stopped by to thank the League for taking time to help employees and citizens to register to vote or to update their voter registration information.

We met a lady who told us that when she was a teenager, she waited anxiously to become a senior so she could register to vote. For some reason, whoever did the voter registration did not come to the school her senior year and she never registered. When we asked her if she was registered, she decided it was past time and sat down and completed her application. These are the stories that serve as inspiration to us as we go about our work of getting citizens registered to vote.

We heard all kinds of stories and met people from all walks of life, every socio-economic, ethnic, cultural and racial background. I love seeing people excited about making a difference and understanding the power of every vote, every election.

I'd like to personally thank every League member who participated in any way to represent LWVM as we surpassed our goal again this year. As we prepare for the 2016 election cycle, we know that our work isn't finished--we're just beginning with the focus and attention on young voters. Studies show that when 18 year olds vote, they can be counted on to vote for the rest of their life.

Additionally, I am seeking out opportunities to reach disenfranchised voters. I'm thankful for Kenen Brown, U.S. Attorney General, and the Re-Entry program which allows us opportunities to help ex-offenders obtain or regain voting rights.

It was an honor to serve as the coordinator of National Voter Registration Day. Many thanks to Ken Kronebusch, who was joined by Frank Barragan, South Alabama Regional Organizer at the Alabama Coalition for Immigrant Justice, June Jones, Betty Jones, Chenele Chapman, Myra Evans, Lella Lowe, Holly Wiseman and everyone who participated. Together we helped to make National Voter Registration Day successful by helping people register to vote.

These scheduled meetings are local government groups or boards and are led by people who have been appointed by our elected officials, including the Mayor, to represent the citizens of Mobile County. Observer Corps are LWVM members and friends who volunteer and attend scheduled local government meetings. They serve our community by listening and observing what takes place.

Due to the sheer number of government boards that exist, there is a need to actively recruit additional members and friends of the LWVM to volunteer and to serve in this vital program. As the LWVM membership numbers continue to grow, there is a possibility that some new members or even longer term members of our organization are unaware of our ongoing Observer Corps program.

The Observer Corps presence at these government meetings is a very important one. Not only is the LWV presence becoming increasingly recognized and accepted because of the efforts of past members, but there are many additional effects that our Observer Corps members provide. Our presence serve to remind local officials that their decisions and actions are being noticed, particularly the goals of transparency within our local government and the protection of a citizen's right to know. The brief notes that form a short report help the LWVM membership understand decisions that were made and how they were made. In this way, the LWVM membership is kept abreast of issues facing our community and thereby enabling our leaders, if warranted, to take appropriate action.

We have an extensive list of local government boards that schedule meetings on a regular basis. I know that you will find a board that appeals to your interests. There are five local boards that are of particular interest to our organization, and your attendance at one or more of these meetings is most welcomed.

It is always more enjoyable to go with a friend or a fellow member, either one you already know or are open to getting to know. ## Vote 18 Update -

We continue to present, inspire (we hope) and register high school students with our award-winning program, Vote 18. For our new members, Vote 18 is a fun, interactive 45-minute program that helps new and prospective voters understand the value of their vote, encourages them to register, go to the polls and get involved in their communities. Vote 18 takes the form of a fun, fast-paced interactive game. It covers the history of voting, explains how that is relevant to the lives we are living today.

What makes Vote 18 so effective is the interactive teaching style and role-playing technique. During one class period the leader leads the students through the history of voting, graphically illustrating voting laws and history. Through the dynamics of exclusion, mock elections, group interaction and rewards students experience the economic and social impacts of voting. Vote 18 makes voting personal. Instead of telling students to vote they become active participants in the democratic process and teach each other WHY they should vote.

Our Vote 18 team of Lella Lowe, Barbara Caddell, Andrea Pennington, June Jones and Myra Evans were recently joined by Bea Ishler (making her first appearance as King George!). The Team went to Murphy High School for National Voter Registration Day, as well as McGill Toolen High School and Williamson High School, yielding another 240 registrations! We just learned that LWVM was awarded a pass-through grant of \$600 from the League of Women Voters Education Fund for Vote 18. Thanks to all who helped make this happen!

### Field Trip

Several League members journeyed to Daphne in November to join the Baldwin County League at their luncheon to hear Alabama Secretary of State John Merrill speak.

Merrill mentioned that the ability to register online in Alabama should happen soon. He also reviewed some of the changes to the voter registration form which seems to be very positive, and of course, he discussed the voter ID requirement. He stated that the state's closing of 31 county driver's license offices won't leave residents without a place to get the required I.D. card to vote. He

said state election officials will issue photo voter I.D. cards at county Board of Registrars offices. "Every county has a Board of Registrars," he said. An Alabama driver's license is the identification most people will use when they go to the polls, but he said that other forms of government issued identification will also work."

As was mentioned in the Mobile Press Register, he shared some of the background around the new posters he printed with the Alabama and Auburn football coaches as the models. The coaches are participating to promote voter registration and participation in the state of Alabama. During the football season, videos were played on the jumbotron at Jordan-Hare Stadiums and Bryant-Denny Stadium, as well as local and statewide television and radio stations.



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
